OBJECT OF THE SCHOOL.

HE object of the School is to give a good Modern Education, suitable for boys intended for either business or the professions. To this end attention is given to those subjects which not only afford a good mental training, but which are likely to be of practical use.

The work in all subjects is carefully graduated according to the different Forms, so that a boy in passing up the School goes through a systematic course of instruction. It is therefore advisable that boys should enter the School at an early age so that they may go through each Course. A boy so passing through the School may, at the proper age, be expected to be able to pass (without cramming) the Oxford Local Examinations, the Pharmaceutical Society's Preliminary Examination, the Preliminary Examination required for the various Professions, and the Matriculation Examination of London University.

The entrance age is fixed by the Scheme at 8 years, and a boy may remain until he has reached his 18th year; but on the recommendation of the Head Master the Governors may grant permission, in special cases, for a boy to remain until he is 19 years of age.

It is very desirable for the sake of a boy's future prospects that he should be kept at School until he has at least passed the Oxford Local Examination. The Certificate he would thus obtain from the University is in itself evidence that he has been well educated, and if he desires to enter one of the Professions—to become for instance a Lawyer, a Doctor, an Architect, or a Chartered Accountant—this Certificate will be accepted as a substitute for the examination that would otherwise be imposed.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

MHE Course of Instruction is arranged to comply with the Regulations of the Board of Education for Secondary Schools and includes:

Religious Knowledge;

English Grammar and Literature, Composition, Dictation, Reading, and Recitation;

Geography and History;

Latin;

French;

Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry, Mechanics, Mensuration;

The Principles of Physics and Chemistry, Theoretical and Practical;

Writing and Drawing, Freehand, Model and Geometrical;

Class Singing;

Shorthand, Bookkeeping, and German if required;

Woodwork, with Drawing of Plans, Sections and Elevations in connection therewith;

Physical Drill.

Throughout the School great attention is paid to Arithmetic, a good English Education, and Handwriting.

When a boy has laid the foundation of a good general education, arrangements will be made for giving him special instruction likely to bear on his future calling.

In view of the increasing demand in business for a more thorough knowledge in Modern Languages, efforts are made to give boys an acquaintance with them which shall be practically useful.

The Religious Instruction is according to the Doctrine of the Church of England.

SCHOOL HOURS AND HOLIDAYS.

THE School hours are from 9 to 12.30, and from 2 to 4. There are half-holidays on Wednesday and Saturday. Physical Drill and Class Singing are taken in School hours. There are Three Terms in the year of about thirteen weeks each. The Holidays are a month at Christmas, three weeks from about the middle of April, and six weeks from the end of July.

HOME LESSONS.

OYS are expected to give a certain portion of their time in the evening to the preparation of Home Lessons The work given is almost invariably explained beforehand and ought not to cause any worry.

Parents of Day Pupils are requested to communicate with the Head Master if they find their sons habitually giving either too much or too little time to this work.

In the case of delicate boys the Head Master will make special arrangements.

The preparation work of the Boarders is supervised in the evening, and Day Pupils may attend at this time without extra charge.

SCHOLARSHIPS, EXAMINATION AND PRIZES.


N addition to periodical tests there is an annual Examination of the School in July. Boys in the Fifth Form prepare the work of the Oxford Local Junior, and the sixth are prepared for the Senior Examination. The School is visited by the Inspectors of the Board of Education. The Woodwork is examined by the County Council Inspector of Woodworking. Prizes are given to boys who do well in the Examinations and who have worked well during the year, both by the Governors and various donors.

The Starkey Scholarship of £10 is awarded annually to the best scholar in the School, and the Starkey Prize of £2 10s. 0d. in books is given to the second boy, from the prescribed district.

The Scholarships offered by the Notts. County Council to pupils from the rural districts are tenable at this School.

Sons of residents in Southwell have the preference in the awarding of the Barrow Exhibition, which is of the annual value of £45, and is tenable for three years at St. John's College, Cambridge.

The Choristers of the Cathedral receive their Education at the School without paying Fees.

THE SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

HE School Buildings are situated in the Cathedral Close. All the rooms are lofty, well-lighted and ventilated. Beside the Big School there are Class Rooms, a properly equipped Laboratory, and a Woodworking Shop. These were added to and enlarged in 1908.

Boarders are received in the School House by the Head Master. The House is large, and built specially for a School. The boys sleep on spring mattresses, in properly ventilated dormitories. The Diet is unlimited, varied, and excellent in quality. There is a constant and plentiful supply of drinking water of a high quality, also of hot and cold water in the bath room. The household arrangements are those of a well ordered home. The Head Master and Staff take their meals with the Boarders, and the domestic arrangements are under the direct personal care of Mrs. Wright. The care and comfort of home are thus combined with the discipline, order, and regularity of School.

SCHOOL RIBBON, &c.

LL Boys are required to wear a distinctive cap and a distinctive ribbon for straw hats. For the purpose of maintaining a healthy rivalry the School is divided into "Houses," which have their own distinctive colours. Members of the First Eleven at Cricket and Football are entitled to the School Colours.

FEES.

The Fees are payable terminally in advance. A Term's Notice is required before the removal of a pupil.

Fees for Boarders under 12 years of age (including Laundress and Tuition) Ten Guineas per Term.

Boys can have Private Lessons in Instrumental Music, &c., at the Fees usually charged by Masters in these subjects.

RECREATION.

UE attention is paid to the physical development of the boys. A Playground adjoins the School Premises, and Cricket and Football Fields are near. Drill forms part of the School routine. As exercise is essential for the maintenance of health, all boys, except those who are prevented by weak health, are expected to take part in the School Games. All the Games are carefully organised and superintended by the Masters. The boys are divided into sets, according to age and size, so that all can take part without risk of injury. A Master is present in the Playing Field at all times when Games are going on.

In addition to Cricket and Football, Athletic Sports are held annually.

There is a Library of interesting books, and efforts are made to encourage reading among the boys.

There is an Un-Uniformed Cadet Corps, and Rifle Shooting is practised at the Southwell Miniature Rifle Range.

SPECIAL ADVANTAGES.

HE advantage the School has in being situated in an open space in a healthy country town is proved by its excellent health record. Special attention is given to the general comfort of the boys, and those who are delicate and backward receive every care. The numbers are such that every boy can receive the direct supervision of the Head Master.

The School aims at providing, at very moderate fees, such moral, intellectual, and physical training as shall fit its pupils to fill worthily positions of trust and usefulness.

Southwell is a pretty country town, easily accessible from all parts by the Midland Railway.

The proximity of the School to the beautiful Cathedral of Southwell should give special advantages to pupils who intend to become Architects.

MISCELLANEOUS.

A Public Prize Distribution is held annually, at which boys give Recitations, or Selections from Plays in English, Latin or French, Songs, &c.

A School Magazine, *The Southwellian*, which is published annually in the Easter Term, gives a full record of the School doings, and is intended to serve as a link between the School and Present and Past Pupils. There is also an "Old Southwellians' Society," which plays Annual Cricket and Football Matches with the Present boys, and holds an Annual Dinner.

A Report of each boy's conduct and progress will be sent home at least twice a Term.

Pupils, who in the Head Master's opinion have a bad influence in the School, will after reasonable warning be requested to withdraw.

Pupils will not be allowed to attend School after illness from infectious disease, or from a house in which there has recently been infectious disease, without a Medical Certificate.

A Term's Notice is required before a pupil is removed, or a Term's Fees must be paid.

Parents and Guardians are invited to communicate freely with the Head Master, who will always be willing to give his best attention to anything that concerns the welfare of the boys.

All communications respecting absence, home lessons, etc., should be addressed to the Head Master.


